# A View From The Box

Well, it's that time of year again! Seven months without a ball being bowled, whites all ironed out and clean, coloured pens and pencils sharpened, bar was stocked up thanks to Terry and his team, pitch was looking spectacular thanks to Tom Wells, PA System was installed and everything was in place for what should be an exciting season ahead.

The club started by signing Ryan Hogarth from Standish CC from the Palace Shield and our overseas professional, Avinash Yadav from India.

Our first game of the season was Sefton Park away and much to our delight, it was called off nice and early by Sefton Park Skipper, Paul Horton which meant I could spend my afternoon in Sunderland .... thankfully they didn't dampen my spirits, we won!!

As the weather was better during the week, we hosted newly promoted side, St Helen's Town. The away side won the toss and elected to bowl. A solid score from Richard Staines gave us our first ton of the season, 115, which included 16 x 4's and 2 x 6's and 4 wickets for Captain Taaffe. We hammered them by 122 runs, 25 points in the bag!

The return of Matthew Wood from Northern CC brought more positivity to the team. A great start from him making his league debut at home to Ainsdale, taking 4 wickets in 15 overs and a comfortable 63\* seeing us thrash them by 9 wickets. 20 points. An early exit in the National KO v's Blackpool dampened our hopes of a good cup run.

The merry month of May was here and so was our pro, Avinash Yadav. Despite taking 7 wickets on his debut v's Spring View, we succumbed to a defeat by 44 runs. This would also be the theme throughout May with early Cup exits to Northern and Rainford. A month not so merry.

Being eliminated in all cups, we could now fully focus in the League. June arrived with a bang; we are away to Bootle. A glorious sunny day, Captain Taaffe won the toss and elected to bat. We amassed 245-7 off 55 overs. Richard Staines (74) and Matt Taaffe (58). Yadav taking another 5-fer, we won by 69 runs, claiming another 25 points!

Back on home soil, we were up against Liverpool. The away side won the toss and elected to bat. We bowled them out for 189, Yadav claiming yet another 5-wicket haul, his 4th of the season. Special mention goes to Club Legend, Guy Roberts scoring 101 (17 x 4's) which guided us to a 6-wicket victory, taking yet another 25 points.

On the road again to Old Xaverians. The home side won the toss and elected to bat. We bowled them out for 219. Jack Saunders taking his first 5-fer for the 1st XI and with solid knock from Ed Fiddler (75) and Tom Jefferson (82\*) we won by 5 wickets...yet again...taking another 25 points!

Caldy was next up at home. Captain Taaffe won the toss and elected to bowl. Another 5 wicket haul from Yadav, 4 wickets from Tom Hessey and a wicket for Josh Holden saw us bowling them out for 168. A 105 fourth wicket partnership between Taaffe (83\*) and TJ (40\*) saw us home, winning by 7 wickets. I suppose you could say sweet revenge from the previous meeting between the two sides! 20 points! Ending the month with four wins in four and taking 95 points out of a possible 100! A joyful June!

July started off with a draw away to Highfield, Matt Wood scoring 60. Despite starting the game at Sefton Park, the heavens opened and ultimately ended the day, no result!

I then jetted off on my holidays to Turkey, missing our draw away to St Helen's Town. A big thank you to Davis Tattersall for covering and to Lester Jefferson for keeping me up to date! A close game I believe! I returned on the Thursday before our away game vs Ainsdale and would you believe it.... abandoned! Defeat at home to Spring View on the last game of the month really dented our promotion hopes.

With seven games remaining, we were away to title contenders Newton-Le-Willows. We were waiting patiently in the club car park (Lytham) for Taaffe to then confirm that the game had been called off.

Bootle at home was up next. On a slightly wet outfield the game was underway with the away side winning the toss and electing to bowl. We scored 164-7dec off 38 overs, TJ top scoring with 47. Bootle were well in control at 107-4, but with great bowling from Yadav, we bowled them out for 122!

We travelled to Liverpool the following weekend with only 10 men. Despite telling Matt Taaffe several times I can play 11th man... we played with 10... gutted, ha ha ha! We bowled them out for 120, Yadav and Wood taking 6 wickets and 4 wickets respectively. With a solid knock of 62\* from Staines, we won by 1 wicket! Special mention to Joe Ashton who smacked the ball for 4 in the penultimate over. Taaffe was a relieved man at that moment, never in doubt in my opinion!!

Promotion candidates Birkenhead Park was the last game in August. The hosts won the toss and elected to bowl on a very wet outfield and green track. They bowled us out for 136. The Park felt confident in knocking it off, but we had other ideas. Step up Jack Saunders! We bowled them out for 72, Jack taking yet another 5-fer, 2 wickets for Yadav and



Openshaw and a wicket for Woody. There was a glimmer of hope for promotion. We crushed Old Xaverians by 128 runs, Birkenhead Park lost to Bootle, which meant we were 1 point off second place.

Our final away game of the season arrived, Caldy. Taaffe won the toss and elected to bat. We set the target at 225, with Captain Taaffe scoring his first 1st XI 100\* (13 X 4'S). We rolled them for 74. Yadav claiming his ninth 5 wicket haul of the season and with 3 for Openshaw and 2 for Saunders, this put another nail in the coffin for the relegation candidates. Birkenhead Park beat Liverpool, taking it to the last game of the season.

Finally, the last game of the season is upon us, and we had to go all out to win. We even got Steven Croft to dust down his Lytham kit. The away side won the toss and elected to bowl. We were bowled out for 101. During the tea interval we learned that Birkenhead Park beat Old Xaverians, ending our hopes of promotion. Despite taking 7 wickets on Yadav's final game, we lost by 1 wicket, a good game of cricket!!

Overall, a season with mixed emotions, a lot of inconsistent weather, early, disappointing cup exits, but a lot of positives.

A big thank you to David Tattersall and Caroline Blundell for scoring at such short notice, PA System stored away safely until next season, my voice will be loud and proud!

Heading into my 15th season at the club, here's to a great 2024! I am hearing good things already. Watch this space!

And not forgetting the committee, groundsmen, my dad Dom, and other senior members in supporting us. Your behind-the-scenes magic doesn't go unnoticed. Lastly, of course, a big thank you to Terry, Josh, and the rest of the bar staff for keeping a steady supply.

Now, let's talk cricket. Our journey this season had more ups and downs than England's recent ashes performance. Unfortunately, we started off with a loss to BAC/EE Preston, but then rebounded with 3 straight wins against Garstang, Charnock St James & Grimsargh. Thanks to Chris Fox & Aarin Chiekrie for stepping in as captain whilst I was away for two of those weeks. Before you asked why, no, it wasn't because of a suspension.

Everyone played their part against Garstang. Additionally, Fox pulled off a stunning Bairstow impression. And for the bowling, I have already mentioned him having the best economy among our bowlers. He's one of the youngest in our ranks, with his season's stats of 30 overs, 6 of them maidens and 7 wickets in total. Ethan Brown collected his trophy.

Additionally, we also had awards for standout performances from Stevie Dodd's blistering 67 and Callum Doyle's tree-defying 5-for.



This season the separate north and south divisions were replaced with a single division which meant we would face opponents Euxton and Chorley for the very first time. Playing each opponent only once however meant just 8 fixtures which left us very little margin for error needing to finish in the top two of nine to reach the final. More importantly this gave Dave and I many a selection headache as we tried to balance competitiveness with inclusivity given our 22-strong squad.

The season started well with a comfortable 8 wicket win away win against a strong St Annes team with Isaac Butterfield and Freddie Bourne leading the chase. A narrow win against Thornton with captain Joe Tanner and Henry Roberts in the runs was followed by a comfortable win against old rivals Leyland with Henry Roberts taking 4 for 5, the best bowling figures of anyone in the league this season. Then it happened. After winning all 14 of our fixtures in standard cricket, unbeaten in over a year, on a very hot Sunday morning that caused my scoring iPad to overheat, we lost at Euxton. A late illness meant we faced the prospect of playing with 10 players. I must have had a sixth sense as I threw my youngest son Daniel's whites into the car. Daniel bowled an interleague player as Euxton made 97-6.

After a couple of dubious LBW decisions given by their umpire (not that I am a bad loser) we lost wickets regularly and fell 5 runs short when we were bowled out with 9 balls to go, despite a valiant late 22 from Arthur which looked like it might get us over the line. We'll see Euxton again in the final next week.

The very next night and guess what, we lost again! This time we were at Clitheroe in the Lancashire Cup, against the very dominant champions of the Lancashire League, winners of 18 of their previous 19 games. Yes, I spend a lot of time on play-cricket. We were unlucky in not taking early wickets which allowed Clitheroe to hit a big total that we were not able to chase despite an excellent effort with the bat, particularly from Henry and Seb. Clitheroe then very narrowly lost the Lancashire Cup Final to Didsbury. This meant Didsbury went through to the national knockout and after 5 more wins, tomorrow they face Ealing at Lord's in the Under 13 National T20 Final. Something for the current under 12 Palace Shield champions, Allan and Senthil's team to target next season!

Back to the Palace Shield, with four games left we knew we could not afford any more slips starting with third place Chorley who posted an imposing 126 to chase. Some powerful batting, particularly from Isaac, Freddie and Joe saw us home with 4 overs to spare.

Then came the season's most dominant performance away at Fylde. We were bowled out after 17 overs with an imposing 174, the highest score in the league this year as Isaac, Joe and Archie all retired out. We then bowled Fylde out in 9 overs for 45 runs to win by another league record 129 runs. The highlight was the only hat trick the team has had in 3 years, all brilliantly caught off the bowling of Ben Sands.

It was then that the wheels fell off, thanks to the great British weather. From mid-June to early August the final two games against Fulwood and Garstang were arranged four times and five times respectively only to be rained off. We managed to get teams together every time only for the weather apps to correctly predict our doom. If the games were to be voided, we would finish third and miss the final. Whilst all this was going on there were mumblings about the fact that we didn't have wheelchair access to the clubhouse. So once again Nick went back to the drawing board and came up with a plan for a ramp. The volunteers rose to the challenge and started mixing the extra loads of cement needed to make it. Thank you to Hosk Resin and Neil Mallalieu for putting the finishing touches to the ramp.

The decking was completed in time for the start of the summer sports and Terry was given the task of finding some nice new outdoor furniture to complete the look. Well done, Terry!

The PA System was up and running too, much to the delight of Luke Norris, who couldn't wait to get his hands on the microphone. Both he and David Tattersall continue to give us our match commentaries on a Saturday, which all helps to create the Welcoming Environment at Lytham CC.


I was honoured to be Dave's best man – a decision that Dave probably regretted when I was overcome with emotion during my speech! I still haven't lived it down.


